



Malaria-Leishmania Co-infection A NIMBioS Investigative Workshop

May 26-28, 2015 NIMBioS at the Univ. of Tennessee, Knoxville

Malaria and leishmaniasis are the two largest parasitic killers in the world. Due to geographic overlap of the diseases, co-infections exist in large populations, but have been poorly investigated. The focus of this workshop is to identify challenges for the control of malaria-leishmaniasis co-infections in South Asian and the African continent. The workshop will also model the complexity involved in the propagation of these co-infections in resource limited regions. The types of data needed to analyze co-infection models and associated uncertainty will be assessed. Experts will present field and quantitative challenges with persistence of co-infection cases of malaria and leishmaniasis.

Participation in the workshop is by application only. Individuals with a strong interest in the topic are encouraged to apply, and successful applicants will be notified within two weeks of the application deadline. If needed, financial support for travel, meals, and lodging is available for workshop attendees.
